Trash collection during the week of January 16th will remain unchanged, due to the fact that the trash hauler does not observe Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

CANDIDATE FILING - APRIL 2017 ELECTION

Filing for Marshal and Aldermanic positions in Wards 1, 2 and 3 for the April 4, 2017 election opened at 8:00 a.m. on Tuesday, December 13, 2016 and will close at 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 17, 2017. The minimum ages are 25 for Marshal and 18 for an Aldermanic position. Candidates may file for office at City Hall during normal business hours, 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

There are a number of severe weather hazards that affect Missouri, including thunderstorms, tornadoes, lightning, floods and flash floods, damaging winds and large hail, snow and ice. Severe weather hazards have the potential to cause extensive property damage, injury and/or death. The National Weather Service and the American Red Cross have developed Emergency Preparedness Guides, which contain information about winter weather terms and tips for staying safe at home, in the car and at work or school.

Emergency preparedness is no longer the sole concern of earthquake prone Californians and those who live in the part of the country known as "Tornado Alley". Knowing what to do during an emergency is an important part of being prepared and may make all the difference when seconds count. Go to www.ready.gov for preparedness tips.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN ACTION

Adopted the following by Ordinance:

- Approving a Subdivision of Land at 86 Augustine Road.
- Authorizing entering into an Agreement for the Provision of Banking Depository Services.
- Authorizing Renewing the Employment Contract with Craig Sabo for City Administrator Services.
- Amending the Municipal Code relating to Telecommunications Facility Regulations.
- Authorizing entering into a Contract Extension for City-wide Residential Trash Collection Services.

HOME SAFETY TIPS

The high cost of home heating fuels and utilities has caused many people to search for alternate sources of heating. The following is a list of things to help prevent potential fire hazards:

- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Never allow children to play near any heating source such as a fireplace or space heater.
- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney professional and use a metal mesh screen when in use.
- Have a fire extinguisher available.
- Store fuels in proper containers keeping them out of the reach of children and away from combustibles.
- Teach young children that hot things can burn them.

In at least 23% of all fatal residential fires no smoke alarms were present. Keep your family safe by installing a smoke and carbon monoxide alarm on every level of your home and inside bedrooms. If your bedrooms are on an upper level, you may want to purchase an emergency escape ladder. In addition, have an escape plan ready and practice it on a regular basis.

SNOW REMINDER

During winter storms, it is a great help to the City's Public Works Department if vehicles are parked in driveways. City snowplow crews are able to do a more thorough job if they do not have to plow around parked vehicles on streets.

LIVE CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL

All decorations (including tinsel) should be removed for Christmas tree disposal after the holidays. Do not place trees in plastic bags. It is not necessary to cut and bundle Christmas trees for pickup.

ADDRESS NUMBERS

Just a reminder, as required by City Code, all residential property located within the City limits shall have address numbers, a minimum height of 4", affixed to your residence or placed on the property so as to be clearly visible by emergency and City vehicles from the street in front of the residence.

RECYCLING

Waste reduction has many environmental benefits. Recycling, including composting, diverts millions of tons of material away from landfills annually. Recycling prevents the emission of many greenhouse gases and water pollutants, saves energy, supplies valuable raw materials to industry, creates jobs, stimulates the development of greener technologies, conserves resources for our children's future and reduces the need for new landfills and combustors. PEDESTRIAN SAFETY RULES

Just a reminder when walking or riding bicycles along thoroughfares - the rule of thumb when walking is to always walk facing the oncoming traffic. However, when riding a bicycle, you should be traveling in the same direction as the traffic flow. In both instances wear light colored clothing and reflective material during the evening hours.
